ATTENDANCE MATTERS!

Good attendance is essential if pupils are to take full advantage of school and gain the appropriate skills, which will equip them for life.

Getting to school every day, on time means:

- Improved life chances.
- Building lasting relationships.
- Reaching their full potential.

What does the law say?

- By law, all children of compulsory school age (5-16) must receive an appropriate full-time education.
- It is a parents/carers legal responsibility to ensure that this happens.
- If a child fails to attend school regularly, or is persistently late, the Educational Social Worker (ESW) can take legal action against the parent.

School Procedures

- Teachers take their registers at 9.00am each morning.
- Pupils who arrive later than 9.30am will be marked as late (L).
- Absences can be authorised by letter, by a phone call, or by verbal reasons given by an adult.
- Registers are checked for pupils absent each day. For those
 pupils who we have not been informed regarding their
 absence that day, you will receive a text message asking you
 to notify us as to why your child is not in school. The LA
 Attendance Officer may also be informed for those pupils
 who we have concerns about regarding their attendance.
- If your child has been off from school and you have not informed us, you will be sent a letter with a proforma to fill in, explaining why they were off. This will allow us to keep our registers up to date and accurate.
- An attendance record card will also be sent home to let parent's know their child's attendance percentage . These are colour coded using a traffic light system:
 - Green: 95+%
 Congratulations your child has good attendance and is doing well. Keep it up!
 - Amber: 90-95%.
 You're nearly there. Remember every day counts.
 - Red: Below 90%
 How can we help you improve your child's attendance?



Encouraging Attendance

At Gwenfro School, we aim to encourage our pupils to be good attenders....







- ✓ We have a weekly attendance league. A graph showing attendance for each class is displayed in the school hall and the winning class over the period of a term will be rewarded.
- ✓ There is also a whole school competition where any pupil who
 achieves 95%+ attendance throughout the year will go into a
 prize draw.
- ✓ Each class displays their weekly attendance on their door, so
 pupils are aware and can discuss ways in which they can
 improve on this, encouraging them to work as a team.

Punctuality

It is important that your child arrives in school on time. If they are late:

- It sets a poor example as they grow up.
- It makes your child stand out from others, causing them to feel anxious or embarrassed.
- It disrupts your child's learning and that of others.
- It may result in a series of unauthorised absences and investigation by the ESW.

If your child is late for school, we ask that you bring your child to the main entrance of the school and sign our punctuality monitoring book. This will allow us to identify those pupils who are persistently late, and help to support you in ensuring that your child is in school on time, every day.

Tips to get your child to school on time....

- √ Have a reasonable bed time.
- ✓ Make sure your alarm is set to wake you up.
- ✓ Allow time for breakfast.
- ✓ Make sure their uniform is ready.
- ✓ Pack your child's bag the night before.
- ✓ Set off in good time.

Family Holidays

We strongly advise parents/carers not to take children on holiday during term time. It inevitably has an adverse effect on their progress at school.

Parents/carers do not have the automatic right to take their children out of school during term time, they must seek permission from the Headteacher.

A family holiday <u>may</u> be authorised by the Headteacher for a <u>block</u> of 10 days. The school will carefully consider such a request and we will take a child's attendance record into account.

A request for a 'one off' day may be authorised at the discretion of the Headteacher.

Can we help?

Your child's class teacher is the first person to go to if your child is having any problems. Let us know and we may be able to help and support you.

Somebody in school is always willing to listen to you or your child's worries, concerns or problems.

We understand that even minor matters can be big worries to your child. No one should feel that they do not want to come to school.
